HIGHLIGHTS OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS

TAKING HUMAN AND SOCIAL SERVICES TO GREATER HEIGHTS, YEAR AFTER YEAR



SENIOR SERVICES

HOLOCAUST SURVIVOR SUPPORT

JCCGCI's Holocaust Survivor Support Services division (among the largest programs of its kind in the world) delivers compassionate, life-sustaining care to some of the most vulnerable Holocaust survivors. This past year alone, we provided 1,901,836 units of service to 3,048 survivors, ensuring dignity, connection, and support through Homecare, Transportation, Case Management, Homebound Visitation, welcoming Drop-In Center programs, and nourishing Congregate and Home-Delivered Meals.

HOME CARE

1,708,677 hours of personal care (including bathing, dressing, and feeding assistance) and housekeeping was provided to 1,204 low-income, frail, functionally disabled elderly.

TRANSPORTATION

110,661 units of transportation services were provided to 6,125 frail elderly, facilitating their access to medical and essential non-medical appointments and services.

FRIENDLY VISITING

Our volunteers and social work interns conducted 4,504 hours of visits to 239 isolated homebound seniors, offering socialization and a link to the outside world.

TELEPHONE REASSURANCE

Our social workers and case management staff made 4,332 caring reassurance calls to 80 isolated older adults, offering comfort, connection, and peace of mind to those who might otherwise feel alone.

OLDER ADULT CENTERS

Our eight Older Adult Centers located throughout southern Brooklyn provided 237,454 congregate meals and other healthy aging, educational and recreational programming to 5,136 older adults

HOME DELIVERED MEALS (ALSO KNOWN AS MEALS-ON-WHEELS)

116,230 freshly-cooked home-delivered and holiday meals to 2,402 frail, homebound older adults were provided.

CASE MANAGEMENT

Our social workers and caseworkers provided 21,684 sessions of case management (including needs assessment, personalized care planning, and coordination of support services) to 3,079 older adults.

HEALTH INSURANCE COUNSELING CENTER

Our Health Insurance Counseling Center provided 1,350 hours of counseling and advocacy to 250 clients, helping individuals navigate complex health coverage options, secure critical benefits, and gain peace of mind.

EDUCATIONAL SERVICES

HORIZONS ACADEMY

1,713 hours of college and career preparation and counseling services were provided to 176 students assessed at high-risk of dropout at Abraham Lincoln High School—resulting in a 100% graduation rate.

COMPREHENSIVE AFTER-SCHOOL SYSTEM OF NYC

200 students benefitted from extensive tutoring, homework assistance and enrichment programming at two sites in Crown Heights, Brooklyn.

EXTENDED SCHOOL DAY/ SCHOOL VIOLENCE PREVENTION PROGRAMS

749 students benefitted from various violence prevention programming at 2 public schools in Coney Island.

EXPANDED AFTER-SCHOOL PROGRAM

105 public school students benefitted from tutoring, homework assistance and other enhancement services at P.S. 288

SUMMER CAMP SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

Summer camp scholarships were provided to 82 needy children, ensuring they had access to summer camp.

CAREER SERVICES

ADULT LITERACY

607 low-income, Limited English proficient immigrants were provided English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) instruction at sites in low-income immigrant communities throughout the five boroughs of NYC, resulting in 397 individuals making substantial educational gains.

CAREER SERVICES PROGRAM

1,113 individuals from low-income Ultra-Orthodox Jewish communities and other diverse populations received culturally sensitive career support and were prepared for improved employment opportunities through our **Community Centered Workforce Development Program**, with primary service sites in Borough Park, Williamsburg, Far Rockaway, Crown Heights, and Gravesend.

301 low-income Haredi individuals were assisted in their job search through the **Parnassah Employment Services Program**, including 289 career counseling sessions and 271 résumé preparation sessions, resulting in 87 job placements. **The Crown Heights Career Assessment Program** served 201 individuals, providing 370 career counseling sessions, 52 job placements, and 37 scholarships. **The Crown Heights Career Hub** enrolled 118 community members in business courses, with 75 participants securing employment or pursuing higher education in their chosen fields.

MANAGEMENT SERVICES

CAPACITY BUILDING FOR NONPROFITS

JCCGCI's NonProfit HelpDesk capacity-building division delivered trainings and one-on-one technical assistance to 1,512 nonprofit professionals citywide, helping strengthen the efficiency, accountability, and effectiveness of their organizations' programmatic, fiscal, and administrative operations.

COMMUNITY SERVICES

OPERATION "H.O.O.D." (Helping Our Own Develop) CURE VIOLENCE PROGRAM

60 violence interruptions were achieved, and 65 high-risk youth received intensive mentoring and support, including mental health care, job readiness training, and life skills development.

URBAN NEIGHBORHOOD SERVICES

At this multi-service center, a total of 7,031 diverse social service sessions were conducted, serving 2,017 Coney Island residents.

SOUTHERN BROOKLYN COMMUNITY SHUTTLE BUS

4,168 units of transportation services to 192 south Brooklyn residents facilitating their access to essential employment, education, shopping, appointments and services.

MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

24 clients in Coney Island benefitted from 80 therapeutic mental health counseling sessions.

TRAUMA RECOVERY CENTER

110 victims of violent crime residing throughout Brooklyn were provided therapeutic intervention and holistic wraparound services in individual and group sessions

BUILDING RESILIENCE IN YOUTH

More than 211 youth have been screened to identify mental health needs, resulting in nearly 100 referrals to supportive services, including educational programs, workforce initiatives, and case management, with 14 referrals made to Community Mental Health Partners at IDCC. Through collaboration with 11 internal programs and 6 community-based organizations, access to care has been expanded and awareness increased through participation in 24+ community events.

WORK PLUS PROGRAM

16 at-risk and justice-involved youth in Coney Island were provided with work readiness and employment services
